May brought us to the Old Fashion Days in Caledonia. Participants joining the festivities were Fred, Sherry, Sue, Carol, Doreen and her husband, David, and Kris, our newest member. Kris was presented with a refurbished machine from Fred. She is Sue and Carol's sister-in-law.

The day was pretty much a day of demonstrating and educating the public as to the history of sock making and how the machines came into production. Fred discussed the mechanics of the machine, which the men were fascinated with. All age ranges of people attended the festival. Sue and Carol discussed the history of the machines and sock making years ago. Sue is an avid spinner so she spun her roving while Carol made and demonstrated the use of the sock machine.

Sherry set up a flax demonstration and discussed the processing of flax. Sherry is also multitalented. She has a great knowledge of the fiber arts. She weaves, spins, and also dyes her own yarns. Cathy Heinz set up a booth displaying and selling her alpaca goods; socks as well as other garments. Cathy is a great sock maker as well as a knitter. She uses alpaca yarn for her socks and clothing. Cathy and her husband raise their own alpaca.

At the end of May, Stella, Jean and Fred attended and demonstrated their sock making machines at the Old Fashion Farm Days on the grounds of the historic Babcock Museum in Barker New York. The day consisted of demonstrations of old time trades and farm equipment. Fred is such an asset to our guild with vast knowledge about the history of the many makes of the circular sock machines.
